
HONOR SENIORS

The United High School Press Congress was held in Huntington, Friday and Saturday, April 8-9. This was the Twelfth Annual Congress of the U.H.S. P.


This congress is held each year under the auspices of the Department of Journalism at Marshall college in the intrest of better journalists.




Ruth Lewis won in extemporaneous speaking and repressnted Talcott High School in the State Contest which was held at Morgantown, W. Va., April 9.




SUMMARY OF THE ATHLETIC SEASON

LORENE HOKE


For three years Lorene has been a bulwark on defense and whose eagle eye and courage has kept many a basket from being made. Her strength and good sportmanship will be sorely missed.


